The Federal Road Safety Commission remains resolute more than ever before in its resolve to offer qualitative service to the nation in Road Traffic and Safety Management especially as the issue of Road Traffic Crash (RTC) has become a public health concern worldwide.

The Commission's activities and programmes witnessed significant upsurge with the repositioning of the Commission through its new management, creating a more enhanced enabling environment for the realization of its objectives and goals, series of programmes and plans of action which were embarked upon with alloyed support from relevant stakeholders and all tiers of government.

The long awaited Road Safety Standardization Scheme Policy Document

was launched and billed to take effect from 1st January 2008. Tremendous support was given by the government while relevant stakeholders have taken it as a working tool. With this, traffic agencies are able to cope with the challenges and scope of operations thereby being well positioned to combat the scourge of road traffic crash.

With an increase in the staff strength of the Commission, capacity building through training and adequate logistics, its impact is felt more around the country while efforts are on to open more offices in phases in the seven hundred and seventy four 774 Local Government Areas of the country.

While looking forward to greater challenge ahead, it is believed that the coming year will afford the commission more opportunities for many achievements based on the solid foundation laid in the year 2007. Once more, the government, NGOs and stakeholders are enjoined to brace-up for the challenges ahead as it takes combined efforts to realize this

An Overview

ESTABLISHMENT AND MANDATE

The Federal Road Safety Commission was established in 1988 as the lead agency on Road Traffic Administration and Safety management to initiate policies and actions geared toward reduction in Road Traffic Crashes in Nigeria. The Commission headed by the Corps Marshal and Chief Executive also has a council that overseas its activities.

ADMINISTRATION

The Corps Marshal and Chief Executive is at the helm of affairs at the Commission's National headquarters assisted by the Deputy Corps Marshal, eight departments viz: Operations Logistics; Policy, Research and Statistics; Motor Vehicle Administration, Administration and Supply; Finance and Accounts; Special Marshal and Engineering and Technical services; Training, Standards and Certification. There are nine Corps Offices which report to the Corps Marshal, they are; Corps Rescue; Corps Secretary Office; Corps Legal Office; Corps Public Education; Corps Provost; Corps Protocol; Tender's Board and Corps Intelligence. A nationwide recruitment carried out to beef up the manpower level of the Commission led to an increase in staff strength from eight thousand six hundred and forty (8640) to a total number of thirteen thousand one hundred and seventy six (13,176) officers and marshals. A new Corps Marshal and Chief Executive, Osita Chikdoka was appointed in May and he resumed office in June 07 the reporting year. The year also witnessed the exit of the board of the Commission and the enactment by National Assembly of the FRSC establishment Act (2007)

SPECIAL MARSHALS

The volunteer arm of the Corps (Special Marshal) increased from 6076 to 10, 000 in the year under review while the Road Safety Club membership ie. (Road Safety Club in NYSC, primary and secondary schools) also increased from 14,667 to 23, 496.

OPERATIONS

In its bid to reach out to the 774 local Government Areas of the Federation, the 12 Zonal and 37 Sector command structure was expanded through creation of more unit commands. Thus, the Commission at December 2007, has 131 unit commands nationwide. The regular patrol and rescue operations received a boost through the creation of Help Areas and Road Side Clinics an major highways in the country that offer emergency medical services to accident victims.

MOTOR VEHICLE ADMINISTRATION

The Uniform License Scheme (NULS) which comprises number plate production, driver license production, saw an increase in the number of workstations of Information Processing Centres from 38 to 52 to enhance in production of the National Driver's License. The Commission also opened the 12 zonal number plate replacement centres.

FEDERAL ROAD SAFETY COMMISSION MANDATE

- Preventing and minimizing Road Traffic Accidents in Nigeria
- Clearing obstructions on the highways
- Educating drivers, motorists and other numbers of the public on the proper use of the highways

- Providing prompt attention and care for victims of Road Traffic Crashes
- Conducting researches into causes of Road Traffic Crashes
- Determining and enforcing speed limits for all categories of roads and vehicles
- Cooperating with bodies, agencies and groups engaged in Road Safety activities on the prevention of Road Traffic Crashes.
- Under the National Uniform Licensing Scheme, the Commission produces driver's license and number plates.

SCOPE AND OBJECTIVES OF THE REPORT

This report seeks to present the activities of the Federal Road Safety Commission (FRSC) in the year 2007, the constraints of the /commission in the year under review, its projections for the years ahead.

CURRENT ROAD TRAFFIC CRASHES STATUS

"Everyday thousands of people are killed and injured on our roads. Men, women or children walking, biking or riding to school or work, playing in the streets or setting out on long trips will never return home, leaving behind shattered families and communities. Millions of people every year will spend long weeks in hospital after severe crashes and many will never be able to live, work or play as they used to do. Current efforts to address Road Safety are minimal in comparisons to this growing human suffering" (World Bank Report on Road Traffic Injury Prevention, 2004)

WORLD TREND

In 2004, the World health organization and the World Bank raised a global alert through its publication, "World Report on Road Traffic Injury Prevention" at the insufficiencies of actions being embarked on by World Governments to arrest the unpalatable trend in road traffic injury. With an estimate of 1.2million deaths and over50 million injured, the world body contended that it was time to act because death and injuries (worldwide) would rise by 65% between 2000 and 2020.

DEVELOPING AND UNDERDEVELOPED COUNTRIES: RTC TRENDS

Worrisome aspect in the 2004 World Report, is that in developing and underdeveloped countries, deaths resulting from road traffic injuries is expected to rise by 80% with majority of such deaths involving vulnerable road users, pedestrians, pedal cyclists and motorcyclists. Various Governments have risen to the challenge in different ways. In Kenya, the National Alliance Rainbow Coalition took the challenge by focusing on specific measures to curtail the prevalent disregard of traffic regulations and mandating speed limiters in public service

The Government of Thailand established a Road Safety Operations Centre encompassing the different sectors opf the country and comprising the government agencies concerned, non-government organizations and civil society to tackle the problem of road traffic crashes. In South Africa a campaign "Arrive Alive" was launched, the campaign is targeted to:

- · Work together to stop growing epidemic of deaths and injuries on our roads
- Encourage African countries to ratify and adhere to international treaties and conventions such as Vienna conventions on road traffic and signs and signals.

RTC TENDS IN NIGERIA

Nigeria used to be one of the most dangerous in term of road traffic crash but the creation in 1988 of the Federal Road Safety Commission led to a mitigation of the problem. Since its

establishment as the lead organization on issues of road safety, the Commission has embarked on many policies and strategies to fight this scourge, through the enforcement of compliance on the use of seat belt and the enforcement of speed limits, aggressive public enlightenment, enforcement of traffic rules and regulations. This had gradually led to a modest decrease in RTC.

BRIEFS ON DEPARTMENTS AND THE NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE YEAR 2007

During the year under review, the Commission had a lot of achievements through departmental contributions to her credit. These are as discussed below.

OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT

The department is described as the heart of the Commission. It is the focal point of FRSC activities especially as it concerns the enforcement and maintenance of traffic rules and regulations and interaction with the public. The department is responsible for the overall operations in FRSC as regards the following activities:

- i. Supervision of full operations and equipment in the Zonal, Sector and Unit Commands.
- ii. Provision of effective and regular patrol on Nigerian roads.
- iii. Formulations of policies and strategies on operations.
- iv. Monitoring and control of revenue generation through fine activities, charging, towing and custody.

Operations department is directly responsible for coordinating the operational activities of the Commission through liaising with the field commands (ie. Zonal, Sectors and Units) as appropriate, proper understanding of road traffic situations, supervision of surveillance to en sure compliance with the Operational Guidelines, and the provision of the required communication for prompt dissemination of information while on patrol.

ACHIEVEMENTS.

- i. Wider coverage of road network through provision of more patrol vehicles and establishment of 47 additional unit commands.
- ii. Establishment of traffic control units nationwide and the introduction of Vehicle

Safety Checks during the 'Ember months'. This was a weekly free vehicle check by patrol teams without defaulters being booked for any offences. The exercise provided a mutual and friendly interface for interaction with the motoring public. It was officially flagged off by the Corps Marshal and Chief Executive.

- iii. Successful launching of ember months campaign by the Senate \president as special guest of honoour, who flagged off the campaign.
- iv. The successful execution of 'Operation Eagle Eye' (a special end of year patrol to en sure free flow of traffic, in notable traffic congestion areas, eg. Lokoja road, Mokwa, Jebba Onitsha and 9th Mile) to curb the perennial traffic congestion and high rate of accidents, which was acclaimed by all as the best strategy ever.
- v. Effective collaboration with relevant agencies and sister organizations in the area of operations such as 'Operation Eagle Eye' and 'Vehicle Safety Checks'.
- vi. Successful end of year patrol with over 8,940,524 kilometers covered and 8,281 accident victims rescued.

POLICY, RESEARCH AND STATISTICS

The department is responsible for the systematic planning concepts, design, conducting researches with the aim of utilizing the findings towards effective and efficient performance. Other responsibilities are:

- i. Collection, collation and processing of data from field commands
- ii. Ensuring quality control of all information and data emanating from the Commission.
- iii. Maintaining a computer record of personnel, results of researches and other related traffic matters.
- iv. Ensure effective management of FRSC library services.
- v. Coordination of conferences, seminars and workshops eg. Corps Marshal Conference at Abeokuta, Ogun State and departmental workshops.

In order to effectively carry out the above functions, the department is further structured into sections and units. The Policy Section supervises Policy, bilateral, Monitoring and Evaluation, Operations, Organization and management Research (OOMR) units., while the Research Section oversees research, statistic, library services and Data Support Services (DSS) units. The Fleet Administration and Traffic Engineering Units were under the Inspectorate Section .

ACHIEVEMENTS

- i. A research was conducted on seat belt and crash helmet compliance which revealed that there is a high level of compliance in the FCT, Calabar and Lagos areas and also showed that compliance reduces further the distance from the Federal Capital Territory.
- ii. Successful launching of, publishing and flagg-off by the Vice President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Dr. Goodluck Jonathan, of the Road Transport Safety Standardization Scheme
- iii. Participation in the United Nation Road Safety Week.
- iv. Serialization of FRSC publications.
- v. Revision of RTC format to meet up with international standard and use of modern statistical tool for RTI analysis.
- vi. Four quarterly reports on Road Condition Summary were completed and submitted to FERMA to facilitate needed repairs on the nation's highways.
- vii. Training of Zonal and Sector Data Inspectorate Officers in respect of the RTSSS implementation.

- viii. Hosting of the executive meeting of African Regional Group of the International Road Safety Organization GPA-PRI
- ix. Identification, Registration, Enlightenment and training of fleet operators with more than five (5) vehicles nationwide
- **x.** Remembrance of Road Crash Victims in November with church and mosque services and a candle light procession through some streets in Abuja.
- xi. Successful conduct of its 2007 Zonal/Sector PRS officers Workshop in Enugu
- xii. Generated PIN (Personal Identification Number) for the newly recruited staff

FINANCE AND ACCOUNT DEPARTMENT

The department has three sections namely: Budget, Accounts and Finance which is headed by a Head of Section. The functions of Finance and Accounts are:

- i.
- Management and preservation of financial portfolios of the Commission Payment of staff salaries and other approved allowances ii.
- iii. Liaising with Federal Ministry of Finance, Federal Budget Office, Office of the Accountant General of the Federation and other relevant ministries on behalf of the Commission.

MOTOR VEHICLE ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT

The department is saddled with responsibility of initiating and implementing and safe driving

These are:

- Successful completion, equipping and staffing of number plate replacement centers in i. eleven zonal commands excluding Lagos which already had the main plant. A total of five (5) centers have been commissioned and the rest are ready for commissioning. The Commission also established ten (10) additional workshops in the following states: Bauchi, Gombe, Ondo, Edo Kwara, Cross River, Abia and katsina to facilitate easy processing of national Driver's License.
- A special software was developed with a new badge status in the driver's license for ii. Diplomats.
- Introduction of customized driver's license, upgrading of both the hard and software iii. used in the production of driver's license. The production of driver's license by proxy has stopped by physical capture equipment in the 36 states of the Federation and FCT.

SPECIAL MARSHAL DEPARTMENT

This department coordinates the Commission's Special Marshal and Road Safety Clubs activities. More members and Units of Special Marshals were registered during the period of review across the filed commands.

CORPS LEGAL OFFICE

This special office handles legal matters relating to the Commission and renders legal advise to Management.

Regularly as the situation warrants, the Corps secretary's Office updates records as it affects fresh appointment, promotion, posting, discipline and disengagement. The Corps Secretary's office gathers collates and analyzes statistics on the Commission's Manpower Strength and requirement, makes projections for manpower plans using indicators like educational qualification, areas of specialization, work experiences and ranks of officers as guide. Whenever the FRSC Disciplinary Review Board is sitting, the Corps Secretary's Office provides secretariat support to the board.

FIELD OPERATIONS INSIGHT

During the year under review, the field patrol and rescue operations indicated that 293,088 offenders were arrested while about 8,477 road traffic accidents occurred. This shows a decrease of about 7% in accident rate from the previous year 2006, which had a total figure of 9,114 accident cases.

The Zonal command kilometer coverage is recorded at about 3,626,760. The command arrested 24,125 offenders who committed 41,306 offences within the period. About 1,710 road traffic crashes were reported in the state with 832 persons killed and 2,179 injured with an average of one point seven offences.

An average of one offender was apprehended for every 150.33 kilometer at patrolled within the Zone. For every crash case reported, point four (0.4) were killed.
